Sacramental Life

Infant Baptism: Celebrated monthly. Registered (minimum 3 months) and participating parishioners may schedule infant baptism after completion of a baptism preparation workshop and reception of godparent documents. Contact Gina Drost, Director of Faith Formation, at 910-791-1003, ext 112, preferably prior to the child's arrival. *Children over 7 are not baptized as "infants." Instead they are prepared to receive all 3 sacraments of initiation at a later date.

To Be a Godparent/Sponsor: for Baptism or Confirmation; you must be a registered, participating member for at least 6 months prior to requesting letter. **1st Reconciliation & 1st Eucharist:** Second grade is our Sacramental year for First Reconciliation and First Eucharist. First grade faith formation is a prerequisite for the second grade Sacramental year. We require four meetings for the parents/guardians of youth receiving these Sacraments. **Confirmation:** Confirmation in our Diocese is celebrated in the high school years, and is a two year process. Candidates may enroll in Level I as a freshman with immediate preparation and celebration of the sacrament in Level II the sophomore year. Stewardship opportunities and attendance to a Confirmation retreat are mandatory.

Reconciliation: We celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation/confession, normally, Saturdays from 3:30-4:30 pm in the Church's Reconciliation Room. In addition, the sacrament is available by appointment. Please call the Parish Office to speak to the pastor.

RCIA: Adults seeking Initiation into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church are invited to contact Gina Drost. gdrost@iccwilm.org or 791-1003, ext.112 Matrimony: Only parishioners registered at ICC for at least 6 months may request to be married here. The couple must meet with a priest before setting a date and at least 6 months in advance of an anticipated wedding in order to complete the preparation process. All aspects of marriage planning requires the participation and approval of trained personnel. Contact: Claudia Sing, csing@iccwilm.org., 791-1003, ext. 100. **Anointing of the Sick:** Anyone who is seriously ill or who is anticipating surgery or an extended hospital stay or who is weakened because of a prolonged illness or advanced age is encouraged to call the

Parish Office to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. <u>Funerals</u>: After a funeral director has been contacted but before any arrange-

ments have been made public, the funeral director will contact the Parish Office in order to arrange for funeral time and/or vigil service. All aspects of parish funeral liturgy planning requires the participation and approval of trained parish personnel. **Vocations to Priesthood or Religious**


Return Your Old Palms

Why Is There Evil?

k some point in one's faith journey, every believer asks: If God is good and loving, why is there evil in the world? Why is there war? Why do children die prematurely? Why do pandemics rage? The biblical story of Job seeks to speak to that question, though it never really answers it.

God and the satan (the name he is called in the Book of Job) are discussing Job and what a fine man he is. The satan suggests Job is a good man only because everything is going well for him. God then tells the satan that he may do whatever he wishes to test Job but may not harm him. By a series of catastrophes, then, Job loses his flocks, his camels, and even his sons and daughters. It is at this point that we hear today's first Scripture reading–Job's lament of misery and hopelessness. Though Job's friends suspect that the cause of all that has befallen him must be due to some grave sin on his part, Job denies this accusation and continues believing in the goodness of God, never wavering in his faith. Though frustrated by what life has brought, Job never blames God or asks God to fix his life. God is God, concludes Job, whether we understand the ways of life or not. To seek any more is to seek to be God. He continues to trust in God and admits that the ways of God are incapable of being understood. This becomes Job's only answer to the question about the "why" of evil.

Liturgy Corner _{By} Paul Turner

🔆 Valid and Licit

IN ADMINISTERING the sacraments, the Church observes what is valid and licit. The terms come from canon law to express a celebration that is effective and permitted.

For example, you need a driver's license to operate a car, and you're supposed to observe other traffic rules. If you drive without a license, you're in big trouble. If you're supposed to wear a seat belt while you drive, but don't, you are guilty of another kind of offense. In that case, you may have a valid license but your behavior is illicit. When we celebrate the sacraments, certain circumstances render them valid and licit. Although we strive to observe both categories, validity is more important than liceity.

For example, for the valid celebration of the Eucharist you must have a validly ordained priest. However, that priest is restricted in the number of times he celebrates the Eucharist every day (twice on weekdays, three times on Sundays). If he does so more often, his behavior is illicit, but the sacrament is valid. In Matrimony, a Catholic is required to follow the Catholic form of marriage. If a Catholic marries in some other setting (without obtaining the proper dispensation), the Catholic Church considers the marriage invalid. When a Catholic marries a Christian baptized in another faith, the priest or deacon should obtain a dispensation for the ceremony. If he does not, the marriage is illicit.

The judgments of what constitutes validity and liceity are entrusted to the authority of the Church. These judgments assure the faithful that their celebrations have the effect intended. In celebrating sacraments, however, we should beware of a minimalist approach, which accomplishes only what is valid and licit. A full celebration, rich in imagery and symbol, will better convey the significance of our rituals and more easily invite the assembly of the faithful into their spirit.
